TAXATION: Ferguson is opposed to the personal income tax and is for stabilization of oil revenues.

State Rural Health Policy

Indian Health Service funds are declining. This results in reduced services for the rural (villages, small cities) communities. State of Alaska currently does not have a policy in place regarding the delivery of health care services to rural residents. Because of the lack of this policy, rural residents could be left without the availability of health services if Indian Health Services was to stop the funding. My goal is to introduce legislation so the small cities and villages will not be without essential health care services.

Employment

One of my primary goals is to protect the limited full time employment in the communities, such as National Guard, Community Health Aide, Seasonal REAA jobs, basic local government jobs and jobs generated from the private industry sector. I will work toward the utilization of the local job skills in community capital projects. And I have made a commitment to help enhance the tourist industry.

Subsistence

The State of Alaska has an acceptable subsistence law now. However, we must continue to make sure that the residents that depend on the fish and game resources for food and handicrafts, have first priority in harvesting the resources.

Availability of local quality **health-care** needs to continue and **drug, alcohol and child-abuse** need special attention.


